Sherry

Fino is the lightest, fruitiest style and the most versatile wine for matching to food. The Olorosso is a full, intense, dry style, gained through over 20 years of maturation

Prosecco

A light style of sparkling wine, carbonated prior to bottling. Light and easy drinking, its all about freshness and lightness of fruit.

Franciacorta

Marvellously refreshing and a delicious drink at all times of the day. Made close to Milan, the fashion capital of Italy. This is made with the same grapes and by the same method as Champagne, but because it lies much further South, has lower acidity.

Champagne

Taittinger are one of the most consistent Grand marques, using predominantly Pinot noir in their Cuvée Brut. The style is light and pure, ideal for indulgent enjoyment as much as celebrating.

The 'Folies' is a single vineyard offering, a much richer and intense style, whereas the 'Comtes' is their top cuvée - perfect for intense moments or highlighting an important event.

Pinot Grigio

This variety has become one of the best selling white varieties over the last ten years.

From Italy, it is generally un-oaked and gives a clean fresh wine, with more expensive bottles giving greater depth of fruit and minerality.

Pinot Gris

Actually the same variety as Pinot Grigio, this term is generally used when it is made outside of Italy.

They tend to be richer and unctuous with more tropical flavours.

Sauvignon Blanc

A huge variety in styles. Marlborough gives us hugely tropical and fruity wines with the iconic Cloudy Bay leading the way 20 years ago.

The Basa is a blend of Sauvignon Blanc and Verdje; you will find this enjoyed in all the best places in Spain, the Verdejo gives a slightly more sweet cut grass aroma.

Sancerre and Pouilly Fume give a more restrained style with crisp green fruit. And our superb, organically produced Tierra Alta is stylistically between the two...

Riesling

Often misunderstood, Riesling is one of the noble grape varieties, which at one time commanded the highest prices of all wines.

If you like Sauvignon Blanc, you should give Riesling a whirl, the majority are bone dry with citrus driven aromatics. Great with spicier or Thai food.

The Rolly has 7 years of age which adds to its richness, it's also slightly off dry. Surely one of the best producers in Alsace.

Chardonnay

A huge spread of styles of wine are made from Chardonnay - from un-oaked crisp Chablis to full, rich oaked examples from Australia and Burgundy.

The la Colombe Chablis is steely and pure, whereas the 'Vaillons' is from one of Chablis top three producers (important to note the difference here between Moreau negociants and Christian Moreau who grows all his own grapes and is meticulous in all details).

This section finishes with two other icons; 'Cullen,' one of the original and best from the Margaret River and is utterly elegant, and 'Domaine Leflaive,' a masterpiece in restrained power and style. Not a modest price, but the best never is!

Chenin Blanc

Chenin Blanc

From its homeland in France, where it makes very fresh and mineral examples, Chenin has travelled well to South Africa.

The 'Still Bay' is unoaked and has full fruit flavours; the 'Vouvray' is tighter and more mineral, whereas the 'Beaumont' barrel ferment adds more buttery oaky flavours to the mix.

The Others...

This is the place to explore less well known varieties which can offer superb value for money compared to more famous cousins.

Cortese is the variety that makes Gavi - a very drinkable, refreshing appley white.

Muscadet from good producers is now vastly superior to offerings of old and a great match with scallops and white fish.

The dry Muscat is a fruit bomb - think lychee, and great with spicier food.

Viognier is becoming more fashionable; a touch of peach is the highlight here.

Seresin (made by the director of such films as Bugsy Malone and Harry Potter) is an aromatic masterpiece, honeysuckle, ginger and apricot - a meal in itself!

White Chateauneuf is done best by Sabon; modern, full and rich.

Pieropan makes a very clean style - try it as an aperitif or with starters.

Gruner is one of the most food friendly white wines there is, and Albarino is master of all things seafood.

Enjoy the ride!

Gamay

After Chaponne Gamay's homeland is Beaujolais, which in recent years has had a quality renaissance from a few of the regions leading growers. We feature three great examples.

All are low in tannin, but the Morel is young, fresh and fruity. The Fleurie is still deliciously soft with more depth of flavour, whereas the Morgon is slightly more robust.

Incidentally, 'La Madonne' refers to 'the church'. Many Fleuries take this as part of their name as reference to the Church at the top of the hill in Fleurie, however in this case Jean-Marc has 'the' site directly under the church with the best located vineyards ensuring the finest Fleurie is made.

Pinot Noir

Pinot Noir is a fickle grape to grow, but in the right hands can produce exceptional wines – light in colour but powerful in flavour and structure.

Fruit led, with New Zealand making the best progress with this tricky grape.

Burgundy covers a huge array of flavours, with Dujac being rightly regarded as one of the best Pinot producers in the World.

Cabernet Sauvignon

Although one of the worlds most recongised varieties; Cabernet is a relatively new variety made by a chance crossing of Cabernet Franc and Sauvignon Blanc in 17th Century France.

Merlot

Merlot tends to be softer and rounder due to its earlier ripening.

Bordeaux blend

Together the two varieties above, along with Cabernet Franc make the blend that is Bordeaux. The 'Videau' is a fantastic value, easy drinking 'Claret' (just another word for red Bordeaux).

Esk is New Zealand's answer to classy Margaux, and the Jean Voisin is a rich nine year old smooth and classy Merlot dominated St Emillion.

Tempranillo

The main grape for Rioja, and also does well in neighbouring Ribera del Duero where it produces a more oaky wine.

The Vega del Rayo is all about the brambly flavour from the grape as it has not seen any oak.

Of the two Crianzas, the Artesa is a more traditional medium bodied gently oaked style, while the Izadi is the modern approach with lots of fruit concentration and new oak.

The 1978 is a stunning showcase of flavours and takes you through over 30 years of history.

Grenache and Mourvedre

Sherry

Go to Jerez, and most people are drinking Fino. Go to the great local tapas bars, and the majority of people are drinking Fernando de Castillo.

Put away preconceptions and try these wines - the most versatile on the list and potentially the best value wines in the world. All sold by the glass.

The Fino is like a white wine, whereas the dry Olorosso is nuttier with citrus notes (20 years old) - the PX is a phenomenally rich 30 year old - almost Christmas pudding in a glass - try it over our homemade vanilla ice-cream.

Dessert

One if not the most interesting place on the wine list - use it to accompany dessert, or even a liquid one if you have had enough real food...

The Asti is sparkling and only 5% alcohol - its a real fruit salad and the Moscato a still, richer fruit salad!

Bonny Doon is deliciously different - fortified Shiraz and raspberry wine - try with chocolate.

Port

The Krohn family make cracking Port - from the fruity Ambassador through the aged Colheita (single vintage tawny) which offer superb value given their respectable ages.
